### Imagine a Digital Treasure Chest

- Family photos and videos: All those special moments you've captured online.
- Email and social media: Ways you connect with loved ones.
- Financial accounts: Banks, bills, and investments you manage online.
- Online stores and subscriptions: Shopping and entertainment services you use.

### Make a Digital Inventory

This is a list that helps you and your loved ones find everything. You can use a computer file (e.g. spreadsheet), a paper notebook, or even a special app. Think of things like:

- Your devices: Phones, computers, tablets, and cameras.
- Online accounts: Email, social media, shopping, banking, and more.
- Important notes: Reminders about automatic payments or subscriptions.

#### Include:

- The type of account (email, bank, etc.)
- Descriptions and passwords: (What the account is for and how to access it.)
- The website (if it has one.)
- Special instructions (Who gets your online photos? Should accounts be closed?)

### **Share Your Digital Inventory**

Pick someone you trust, like a family member, to be your Digital Executor. Let them know where your inventory is kept and give them a copy if possible. This way, they can easily find and manage your online things if you are incapacitated or after you're gone.

# Keep Your Inventory Safe

- Regular updates: Review and update your inventory as things change.
- Backups: Make copies of your inventory and store them safely, just in case.
- Encryption: Consider using a password manager or encryption tool for extra security.
